Introduction to The National Archives (TNA)

- TNA is not a library
- TNA is not a family history site

The National Archives of where?

- England and Wales (from 1536)
- the United Kingdom (which included Ireland)
- records from central UK government departments and agencies, plus parts of the legal system of England and Wales
- British or English colonies or dependencies (including America colonial records)
- certain historical documents, such as Domesday Book (1086)

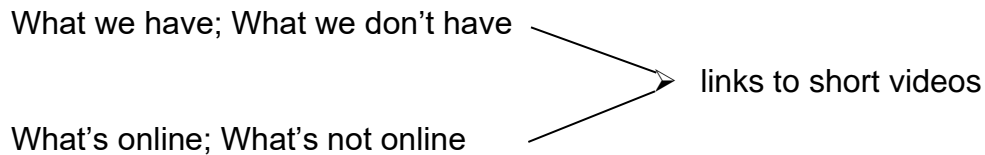
Formation of The National Archives

Public Records Act of 1958 governs what records come into TNA; established 2003

Public Record Office, Historical Manuscripts Commission, Her Majesty's Stationery Office

Navigating – Getting started:

TNA website > “Help with your research” button > “Start here” button:




Research Guides: 358 guides in 12 subject categories

To search research guides by Category: Begin on TNA home page > Click on “Help with your research” button > Click on “Use our A-Z Index” button > Click on “Choose a different subject” link > select category of your choice > select a guide from the results list for your category.

To search with A-Z Index to keywords: Click on “Our A-Z Index” link > Step 1: select a letter in the alphabetical list > Step 2: select a keyword in the list > select a guide from the results list for your keyword.


To search by subject: Click on “Search all guides” link > enter your name of your topic or subject in the search box and click Enter > select a guide from the results list for your subject.

Another path to searching Research Guides: Begin on TNA home page >  > under “Help with your research” click on “Research guides A-Z” > this takes you to main search page for research guides > search by category, keyword or subject as described above.

Note for searching research guides: When searching by category, searching for only guides with all records online is not recommended for initial search by category.

Navigation tips:

- Click on TNA logo  to return to main page
- Use Menu button  for shortcuts/links to other parts of website

Currency Converter: TNA home page > Menu button  > Education heading > in the “Time Periods” panel click on any of the period links such as Medieval 974-1485 > select Currency converter: 1270-2017 <https://www.nationalarchives.gov.uk/currency-converter/>

Useful links in the “Help with your research” heading:

- Menu button > “Help with your research” > “Family history” link > displays 191 research guides for the family history category; use panel on left to select other categories and to refine results in your list of guides within categories
- Menu button > “Help with your research” > “Start your research here” link:
