In 1707, the Kingdom of England joined the [Kingdom of Scotland](#) in union to become the [Kingdom of Great Britain](#). The official language is English.^[1]

The FamilySearch website has an excellent reference page on [England Genealogy](#). This page is a research guide for England ancestry and is useful to both the beginner in England genealogy research as well as those with more knowledge and experience. The page is divided into sections to organize the material and links to other webpages for specific topics. There are many topics listed in the “**England Wiki Topics**” sidebar on the right side of the England Genealogy page (highlighted in red box in the illustration above). Some of the helpful links are highlighted below.

The **blue** button existed previously and is still available. This is a link to a vast collection of online records for England research.



Interactive England Jurisdiction Map 1851 [edit | edit source]

FamilySearch has an interactive map of the [1851 Jurisdictions of England](#). This map allows the user to choose a jurisdiction (such as a county, parish, or diocese) then choose different nearby jurisdictions (like hundred, rural deanery, or province) to see where vital records were housed. A table pops up showing what years parish registers exist, the names of other associated jurisdictions, and other similar search tools.

Jurisdictions [edit | edit source]

A jurisdiction is an area governed by a system of laws. Each jurisdiction has a geographic boundary with some type of authority (i.e., manor, parish, town, county). This authority has the power to apply and enforce the laws. In England birth, marriage, death, census, and other genealogical records are organized and stored in different governmental levels such as parish, town, and county.

If you are researching other parts of the British Isles in addition to England, you can use the FamilySearch website to find similar genealogy reference pages for Wales, Scotland, and Ireland with reference information, links for Wiki topics and research tips and guidance.
